# Social Studies 10 Course Outline

Social Studies 11 helps students understand what it means to be a Canadian citizen. We continue the story of what happens after Canada established its presence through Confederation that takes us into present day time. What are the pieces in Canada's history that makes us feel proud when we tell others that we are Canadians? What are pieces that are injustices that make a dark mark in this country? From the twentieth century, into Canada's role in WWI and WWII, to the Great Depression days in Canada, and finally, through other social, economic, and political changes we look at how Canada has transformed from the past into the Canada we have today. We also look at Canada's Aboriginal and French Canadian Peoples during the nation building process and how we responded over the years. In this course, students will have the opportunity to practise important life skills such as critical thinking, researching, and how to embrace their role as an active citizen.
